

Masters of Arts (M.A.) Semester I-IV

- Any student having Graduate degree in Arts or Science can pursue his Masters in Archaeology
- The Masters in Archaeology is a regular course of Two Years of Four Semesters each
- The medium of instruction for the course will be in English
- Each Semester will be of Six (6) months duration
- Semester I to III will be five (5) papers plus practicals. Semester IV will have four (4) papers and one dissertation plus practicals
- If someone does not clear Semester I, he can continue in Semester II. Similarly if someone does not clear Semester I and II, he can continue in Semester III and IV.
- Each Subject will carry hundred marks (100 marks), wherein seventy (70) marks will be assessed through University assessment and the rest thirty (30) marks will be assessed by the Department through Internal Assessment via Seminars, Assignments, Internal Examination etc.
- The University examination will be of 70 marks (time: 2hrs 15 mins)
- A student will be declared pass only if he gets forty (40%) or more percentage. He/She has to secure minimum twenty eight (28) marks in University Examination and a minimum of twelve (12) marks in Departmental assessment.
- At the beginning of Semester III the students have to submit the letter of declaration for the dissertation title.
- It is compulsory for the student to pass in both external and internal assessment. If a student does not clear his/her internal assessment he will not be declared pass in the paper and he will have to appear again in both the internal as well as external examination in the coming semester. On the contrary if a student clears his internal assessment but is not able to pass the external examination he will have to appear in the external examinations only.
- Students will have to select the subject for foundation course well in advance during the admission time. The assessment of the foundation course will be carried out at the end of Semester II. The students who are not able to clear the foundation course at the end of Semester II will not be declared pass in Semester II and will have to appear again in the next examination.
